Adeara is an accredited addiction recovery centre in Alberta for women and their children. We provide long-term, residential programming to women seeking to break the chains of addiction.

For Women and Their Children

We're proud to be one of few addiction recovery centres in Canada that accepts both women and their children.

Treating the Whole Person

Adeara provides in-depth, research-based addiction treatment, to treat the whole person; biologically, psychologically, socially, and spiritually.

Focused on Long-term Recovery

The program at our treatment centre is one of the lengthiest in Canada, ranging from six months to more than one year, and provides women with the time they need for a new start.

Support for Spiritual Restoration

At the centre of our programming is faith-based practice. We firmly believe spiritual healing is just as important as psychological, biological and social healing. We trust in the spiritual, transformative power of the biblical Christ, who redeems, heals, and restores every single life.

Report from Executive Director

"Reset" is a word that has come up a lot this past year. Like most organizations and households, Adeara had to adapt and adjust to circumstances that came our way in 2020 and 2021. In a way, we were required to apply a reset to our way of doing things. While the adjustment phase was difficult and presented many challenges and hurdles, we saw growth and opportunities as we learned to adapt. Instead of losing hope when circumstances didn't turn out as we had expected, we persevered.

A few highlights that stand out from the past year:

- We raised a record-breaking \$108,000 at Leap of Faith 2020 (jumps were postponed to June 2021).
- We produced our first ever virtual Evening of Dreams Gala.
- In the space of a year, we took possession of a thrift store was gifted to us by Shepherd's Care Foundation, rebranded it as More Than a Fad and opened it as our second location.
- We connected with new local businesses that donated a portion of their profits to Adeara.
- We renewed our accreditation with the Canadian Accreditation Council for the Governance and Management Program, as well as the Women and Family Shelter Program with addiction designation.
- We were awarded the COVID-19 Mental Health and Addiction Community Grant, which provided funds for a Family Wellness Program, an Enhanced Aftercare Program and a Prevention Program.
- We were awarded the Community Initiatives Program (CIP) Operating Funding. The CIP provides funding for organizations that create opportunities for Albertans to engage with and help develop their communities.
- We saw residents take advantage of the long-term opportunity for recovery we provide.
 - We've seen 39% of our residents exceed 9 months in the program during the fiscal year and 27% percent stay over a year.
 - The longer these ladies invest in their recovery at the centre, the greater chance they have in sustaining their recovery in their independent living.

The greatest reset of the year is represented in the lives that have been changed and in the children who've been given healthier mothers and happier homes. Women's' lives are truly being rebuilt at Adeara. I continue to be amazed at the transformation I see and hear from the residents, as they share their healing journey with us and change the trajectory of their futures.

Thank you to each of you who have invested your time, treasure and talent to Adeara to support the necessary changes. You have given over and above to the centre and have made a huge impact this year!

Randi's Story

Before I came to Adeara, I was in a dark place. I lost my brother and my dad. My daughter Matt-Lynn had been taken away from me. Through those dark years everyone around me was telling me "You just need to pray." I thought, "Pray, yeah right." I'd go back to the way it was in my childhood.

I lost all faith in a God when I was 12. I started using hard drugs and selling drugs. I guess you can say I grew up way too fast. My uncle abused me at the age of 9 and another uncle again at the age of 11 to 13. I had no trust in this God who I thought was supposed to protect me. I went from 9 to 19 fast. I was in and out of jail my whole life and in abusive relationships. Then I got pregnant and my ex beat me up so bad I lost my baby at 8 months. The doctor said I'd never have a baby again. I was so sad. All I ever wanted was to be a mom—a good mom—but once again this God person let me down. So, I was dead inside.

My best friend James said, "Why do you think you feel so much craziness in your heart?" I corrected him and said, "I'm not capable of love. I have way too much hate in my heart." This was right after I took my brother Peter o life support on December 1st, 2017. He had overdosed on fentanyl in the Edmonton Remand Centre. Just before that, my dad had hung himself. So, dealing with loss after loss, I just gave up.

I started to use even harder. I shut down 100 per cent. I lied and pushed my family away. I was so mean to my mom. In my head, she gave birth to me, she's the reason I'm here, so I hated her. I hated life. Then I went to jail and found out I was 6 12 months pregnant with Matt-Lynn.

I couldn't believe it. I was released into sober living but got back together with Matt-Lynn's abusive dad. Child Protective Services took her from the hospital. Once again, all hope was gone. I started using again, harder than I'd ever done before.

I overdosed and died when Matt-Lynn was two on April 12, 2020. My mother revived me. When I came to in the hospital the doctor said, "Don't worry, your baby's fine."

"I look back and see how far I've come these past 6 months and it's crazy—from so dark to so bright. I finally have hope, it's crazy. I love that I'm not filled with hate anymore and I can see a future."

I was pregnant with Kylee. I was already on the waitlist for Adeara and had warrants out for my arrest.

So, I thought, "I need to go to jail. I've got to get away from Kylee's dad and get sober." I ended up going to jail December 30, 2020. By this time, I stopped doing hard drugs and was only smoking weed. By January 1, 2021, I had drugs out of my system.

I ended up having my baby in jail. While I was there the Crown said they didn't care if I'd just had a baby. I wasn't getting out of jail and Adeara didn't have any room. I was praying, "God please. If this is what I'm supposed to do, I'll do it with all of me. I just want to be a mom."

I got back from the hospital to jail and the guards said, "Call your lawyer." So, I called, and my lawyer said, "You're getting out and going to Adeara." I called my worker and she said, "There's a bed at Adeara for you."

I was so happy for the first few months. I was here only for

my babies. As time went by, I opened up to counsellors. Almost 6 months later I'm finally here for me. I love myself, my family and everyone. Most of all, I love God. I look back and see how far I've come these past 6 months and it's crazy—from so dark to so bright. I finally have hope, it's crazy. I love that I'm not filled with hate anymore and I can see a future.

My dad left me property when he passed away, so I want to start a youth group there. There's an old church on the property and a house. I want to use the house for moms and the church for kid's activities. I have my Business Corporation Management, so I can own my own business. That's what I want to do, because I want to help kids. I know that trauma comes from a young age, so I'd like to help teens who have experienced sexual abuse and addiction.

Program Update

This year has certainly been a time of change and brought us an opportunity to provide a fresh reset throughout programming. We created a more balanced programming model from the bio-psychosocial-spiritual perspective and implementing programming modules that pertains to one or more of the above areas. Although COVID-19 still impacted some of our programming in 2021, we managed to adapt to the restrictions in place and still keep a wellbalanced program for our residents. For example, our women now have gym passes with Fit4less, and when the gym was closed, the women did fitness indoors (or outside weather permitting) usually with an amazing resident who had experience instructing fitness, which was a lot of fun for the women. When the churches were online only, the women had church online in the centre; so, all in all we managed quite well through the pandemic and will continue to do so.

It was sad to have one of our counsellors leave mid-May to continue to focus on her private practice. We have been unable to fill her role until just recently and we are excited to have a new counsellor join the team as of September 1, 2021.

In January we had 10 women in house (our maximum capacity) and from February until July we had a consistent 9 women (and children) in house with 3 of our long-term residents moving into independent living July/August. Of those three long-term residents, two just started school this month and the third moved back East to be with her family and begin her newly gained career in dog grooming. She was mentored by one of our long-time volunteers who took her under her wing and taught her a career in dog grooming. It is so exciting to see the hard work these women do to change their lives come to fruition.

This past year we also did something else in our programming that we are pretty excited about! We currently have 3 of our alumni involved in programming at the centre. Two of our alumni come and teach a class, and one is co-facilitating our aftercare group. We also have two of our alumni who are currently work in our MTAF store. I am a firm believer in having those in recovery help those needing help in recovery. Step 12 in AA/NA states, "Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to [alcoholics/addicts], and to practice these principles in all our affairs." The strength and confidence that our women in house get from these amazing alumni is so beautiful to watch and hear them say – "Well...if they can do it then just maybe I can do it too!"

One of the most precious moments I get to experience working with the women is watching them develop a personal relationship with God. To hear them say "I'm just praying about it" or "I'm just trusting God with this" is such a blessing to me and I know it is to all our staff as well. As we continue to open our doors to women and children in the Edmonton area and soon in Sylvan Lake, I know God will continue to restore women and children that come to us for help and will move in a mighty way in their hearts.

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Projects

The Carus Trust

The Carus Trust is a not-for-profit alliance of the People at Risk (PAR) Foundation and Adeara. We are likeminded, faith-based organizations working together on a shared vision. The Carus team sources tools, such as vehicles and real estate assets, for Adeara and PAR, enabling us to better carry and expand our missions.

Sylvan Lake Centre

The Carus Trust recently acquired property in Sylvan Lake that will be used by Adeara to expand our addiction programming. Set to open in 2022, the Sylvan Lake centre, called the Adeara Lakeside Recovery, will be a short-term addiction treatment centre for women in Central Alberta. Since its announcement in 2021, the Sylvan Lake centre has received the blessing and support of so many in the local community. We look forward to opening its doors and helping more women in desperate need of care.

Carus Community Centre

The Carus Trust is also working on a large project in Edmonton, called the Carus Community Centre. This welcoming, multi-purpose facility will support men, women, children and families through a range of services and opportunities. The space will aim to be self-sustained and generate profit through the rental-income of housing units and more than 70,000 sq. ft. for commercial rental space, which will be available for businesses suited to the community, such as medical offices, daycares, and other businesses. The Carus Community Centre will allow Adeara to expand our programming with more than 50 new, custom-built apartments for residents and approximately 100 nearby affordable housing units on the same land, available to Adeara alumni. This opportunity will allow alumni and their families to stay close and remain connected to their community, while gaining their independence beyond Adeara's recovery program.

The Carus Trust is currently acquiring land and updating the facility floorplans. The original concept was developed by Professor Avi Friedman, acclaimed architect, author and UN prize winner in the affordable housing world. Next step is to proceed with rezoning and obtaining development permits and building permits. Our goal is to break ground Fall 2022 or Spring 2023.

Renewed Accreditation Status

Every four years, Adeara must go through a rigorous process of examining every element of its programming to ensure it meets national standards set by the Canadian Accreditation Council. After months of preparation and CAC's third-party evaluation, we're happy to report Adeara has renewed our CAC accreditation in 2021. Our enhanced designations (or areas of specialty) through CAC are: Governance and Management and Woman and Family Shelter Program with Addiction Designation. Maintaining accredited programs are a top priority for Adeara, so we can continue to offer a national level of support to women in need.

What is the CAC?

From the CAC website: "The Canadian Accreditation Council (CAC) is a non-profit organization that has itself been accredited by the International Society for Quality in Health Care (ISQua), the leading international health care evaluation program. [The CAC] is dedicated to promoting service excellence by using a peer review process based on best practice standards."



More Than a Fad

More than an ordinary thrift store, More Than a Fad (MTAF) is helping women break free from addiction, one purchase at a time. On July 1, 2021, MTAF launched in a new location, formerly known as Treats N' Treasures, which was owned by Shepherd's Care Foundation. Over the past 12 months, MTAF has received tremendous support. New faces and familiar faces and the general Edmonton community have all blessed us by donating, volunteering and spreading the word.

As awareness for MTAF continues to grow, so has Adeara! In July 2021, just a couple days shy of our oneyear anniversary, MTAF opened its second location in the Kingsway area of Edmonton. Through this second location, MTAF has been able to increase its staff and purchasable merchandise, engage new people with the work Adeara does, and advance the discussion of addiction recovery across our community.

Retail Experience for Adeara Residents

Through an integration of Adeara's programming, women in recovery at Adeara have the opportunity to gain retail work experience by volunteering at MTAF. This incredible opportunity helps women build their resumes, develop workplace skills, work in a healthy team setting and prepare for a life outside of Adeara.

Awareness Building in the Community

Changing lives is more than a fad! The MTAF team is passionate about educating the public about addiction recovery in Edmonton, spread awareness about Adeara's mission and build community among our staff, volunteers and shoppers. Shoppers learn about Adeara through signage on display in the store, talking to our volunteers and following MTAF on social media

Financial Support for Adeara

MTAF is largely volunteer led and contributes 100 per cent of its profits to Adeara. This year was a profitable one for MTAF and as we've earned profits, Adeara has redirected these funds into opening a second and third location, to match MTAF's item donation drop-off rate and increase revenue for Adeara next year.

9th Annual Evening of Dreams

This was Adeara's first year hosting an at-home fundraising event. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, our formal Evening of Dreams Gala, which typically hosts up to 600 people, was cancelled. A virtual experience took its place. While it was a different format than we're familiar with, it was an incredible opportunity to use modern technology to show what Adeara is like behind-the-scenes.

More than 100 people tuned in on gala night (November 20, 2020). In the days that followed, the gala video reached more than 600 views! We were pleasantly surprised to see several positive connections take place on the live chat on gala night. We also received lots of encouraging comments for our residents and staff.

In terms of fundraising, the gala produced a fraction of its typical fundraising capability—this is the nature of online events. While we're delighted to have more people learn about Adeara on a deeper level, we knew the format would not provide the same opportunity for personal engagement and connections as the formal event does.

We're looking forward to sharing the content from the gala as individual, stand-alone pieces.

The 2020 (virtual) Evening of Dreams gala challenged our ability to adapt to new circumstances and taught us how to connect with our audience in a new way. This experience will keep on giving, as each video used to build the virtual program was designed to function as stand-alone videos that Adeara can use for future promotional materials for years to come. We're delighted at the outcome, despite not achieving the level of financial support we've received in previous years. We enjoyed collaborating with local artists and businesses to make the virtual experience happen.

Financial Year Summary

2020/2021

Our plan for 2019-2020 was to increase our monthly income and that remained a focus for this year as we looked to expand. The COVID-19 pandemic continued to challenge these goals, but we are so grateful for the generous support of our donors throughout this past year. While we have been fortunate to receive government support, and the opportunity to apply for additional grants, it is the continued support of our donors that makes our work at Adeara possible.

The pandemic made hosting fundraising events difficult, but our team adapted to the ever-changing situations. We hosted a virtual Evening of Dreams Gala and postponed the Leap of Faith event—with successful jumps taking place in June 2021. We also participated in new events, such as the Coldest Night of the Year, which allowed us to connect with other organizations and expand Adeara's awareness. The success of our More Than a Fad thrift stores continues to amaze us. We opened a second location this year and are slated to open a third location in the coming months. The team has done a wonderful job generating funds for Adeara, while navigating the COVID-19 restrictions with grace. Our partnership with Wall Coffee Roasters continues to grow and our own branded Recovery Coffee is creating awareness and support for Adeara.

As we look forward to the coming year, our goal of sustainable expansion remains a priority. We will continue to look for new ways to raise funds and increase awareness throughout the city and beyond.
